## CAROLYN ARCADE-RICE

School(s): Paisley High School

Carolyn Archie Rice and Marvis Archie Johnson dominated the high school tennis scene from the late 1950's to the mid-1960's. Rice was named to the All-State Team from 1957-60. During that period, she won the National Negro girls' singles title.

The Archie tennis dynasty continued with Carolyn's younger sister, Marvis, who was an All-Conference, All-City, All-County and All-State player at Paisley High School. School(s): Gray High School

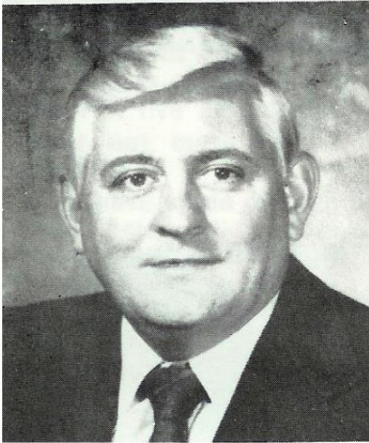
William D. "Dub" Fespennan earned his honors as a three-sport letterman at James A. Gray High School. On the gridiron, he garnered all conference, all city, East-West All Star, and Shirne Bowl honors. In 1951, he was named the city's Outstanding Football and Basketball Player; and he was topped as Outstanding Athlete of the Senior Class in 1952. Fesperman was also an All City and All Conference baseball player and the top hitter in 1951-52. In addition, he lettered in basketball.

Fesperman continued his athletic prowess at Duke University where he earned a B.A. degree in education. While at Duke, played in the 1955 Orange Bowl and Played in the 1953 and 1956 conference championship teams in baseball.

After graduation, Fesperman began a successful football coaching career that included stints as assistant coach at Wake Forest University, Tulane University, Georgia Tech and Dartmouth College. Today, he is a scout for the Houston Oilers of the National Football League.

## JACK MUSTEN

Category: Coach

School(s): Glenn High School

East Forsyth High School

Jack Musten's coaching career spanned 30 years (1954-1984) and three sports: football, basketball and baseball. In six years of coaching basketball and baseball at Glenn High School, his basketball teams were in state playoffs two years, and the baseball team won five straight conference championships. In one four-year period, the baseball team won 108 games and lost only 12. Musten was twice named Forsyth County Coach of the Year.

At East Forsyth, he had seven conference championships or co-championships in baseball and went to the state playoffs nine times. In 1952, he coached the North Carolina All Star Basketball Team. As athletic director, Musten worked closely with leaders of the W-S Forsyth County Schools to plan new gymnasiums for East Forsyth, Glenn and West Forsyth High School.

## HAZEL PHILLIPS

Category: Coach

School(s): Carver High School

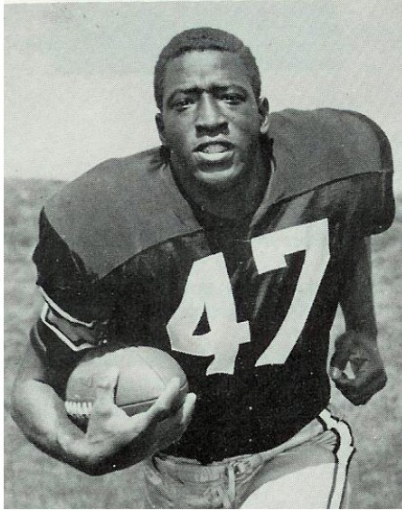
Hazel S. Philips has coached at Carver High School for 16 years with an .848 (481-86) winning percentage in all sports - softball, basketball, speed ball and volleyball- throughout her career. The statistics reflect her success at Griffith High School, Parkland High School and Camp Pla-Mor in Myrtle Beach, Florida.

A graduate of High Point College. Phillips made quite a name for herself as an undergraduate. Her achievements include: hitting 310 consecutive free throws in basketball. playing on the All-World Girls' Basketball Team (1951-52), winning the World's Free Throw Championship and making an unassisted triple play in the State Softball Tournament.

Phillips' competitive spirit carried over to her coaching where she boasts several undefeated seasons and conference/tournament championships. This year, her softball team won the Providence Day Invitational Softball Tournament in Charlotte. The title represents the first trophy won by a Carver athletic team since the four-year High School plan has been reinstated in the Winston-Salem/Forsyth County School System.

## ISSAC "Ike" HOWARD

Category: Player

School(s): Carver High School

Issac Howard was a versatile athlete at Carver High School, lettering in football, basketball, tennis and track. While he was named all-Conference (1963-65), All-State (1965), All-County (1962-65) and All-City (1962-65) in track, football was his forte.

The first athlete to break 10 seconds in the 100-yard dash in Forsyth County, Howard was selected to the East-West Shrine Team (1964-65) and the Parade Magazine High School All-American Football Team (1964-65).

After a stellar career at Carver, Howard went to the University of Colorado. As a sophomore, he picked off a pass at the goal line and raced 99 yards for a score against Missouri. In 1969, he signed a contract with the Dallas Cowboys of the National Football League.

Today, he is Senior Events Coordinator at the M. C. Benton Convention Center and president of the Winston-Salem Sportsmen Club.

## HAROLD SIMPSOM

Category: Administrator

Harold Simpson was actively involved in supporting high school sports throughout his career. As principal of Lewisville High School (1948-56), he chaired the Athletic Committee and the Tournament Committee. In 1956-57, he organized Forsyth County's first high school wrestling team at Southwest Senior High.

During his tenure at West Forsyth (19~ 71). Simpson had a full slate of girls' athletics prior to Title 9 (federal mandate). He also served four years on the Board of Directors of the N.C. Athletic Officials Association.

As assistant superintendent of W-S/Forsyth County Schools (1971-76), Simpson developed athletic programs for 7-8 schools and 9-10 schools. In addition, he initiated the practice of the Board of Education appropriating funds for athletics' operation expenses and promoted girls' athletics.

## JERRY GILLESPIE

Category: Player

School(s): Paisley High School

Jerry Gillespie was a standout football and basketball player at Paisley High School in 1966-68. Newspaper accounts abound of his heroics: "Jerry Gillespie, although burdened with four fouls, scored 14 points in the fourth quarter to spark the Paisley Panthers, 75-68, over their arch rivals, the Anderson Bulldogs ... " (Twin City Sentinel- January, 1967) - "A tense crowd of 3,500 fans was speechless last night when quarterback Jerry Gillespie, apparently falling to the ground after being hit, passed 19 yards to end Dennis Lewis for a Paisley touchdown." (Twin City Sentinel October, 1966).

In 1967, Gillespie captured Player of the Year, All-City, All-State and All-Northwest honors. The following year, he tied with two other athletes in the voting for Player of the Year. As a result, he served as a tri-captain of the All City-County basketball team.
