## CONITA ARCHIE HUNT

Category: Player

School(s): Paisley High School

CONITA ARCHIE HUNT lettered four years in tennis while at Paisley High School, 1964-67. Hunt was the singles runner-up champion in local, district and State High School Athletic conferences, 1964-67. During the 1964-65 season Hunt became the local high school singles champion, singles winner of the Western North Carolina High School Athletic Association (WNCHSAA) and the State singles champion.

She won the singles and doubles championship in both the District and State tournaments during the 1965-66 season.

Hunt culminated her high school career in 1967 by winning the District singles and doubles, the State singles and doubles and the WNCHSAA doubles. She was selected to the All Conference and All-State teams by a unanimous vote.

Her proudest achievement was being named female athlete of the year at Paisley in 1967 and being honored as the Most Outstanding Athlete of the school.

## B.W. ATKINSON

Category: Player

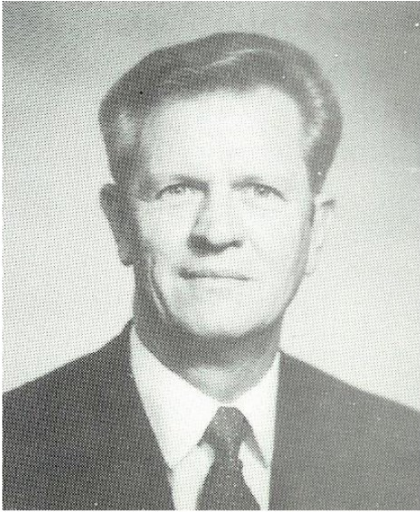
School(s): Gray High School

B. W. ATKINSON lettered in football, basketball and baseball at Gray High School. Atkinson was All-District Conference in football in 1944 and 1945; All-Southern. 1945 and All City in 1943-44-45. His crowning glory came when he was named Outstanding Lineman in the Shrine Game of December, 1945.

Category: Player

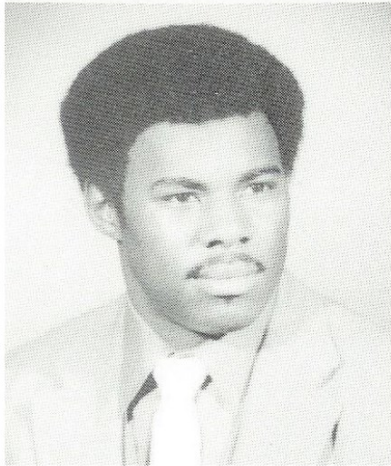
School(s): West Forsyth High School

ASIM RAHIM RAZZAK was known as a model of excellence as he led Carver High School to athletic victories in four sports from 1961-65.

At North Carolina A & T State University he was selected All-CIAA, thus leading the Miami Dolphins to select him as a 5th-round draft choice.

After a brief professional career, Razzak taught and worked with youth projects in underdeveloped countries for several years.

In Winston-Salem he continues to work with youth-serving organizations.

School(s): Atkins High School

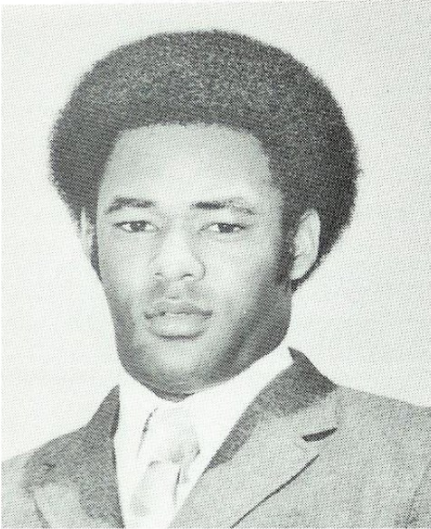
WILLIE (WEED) PORTER continued the long and accepted tradition of "silky-smooth" centers at Atkins High School. Porter became feared in the conference and state circles during his senior season of 1960; He was an unanimous choice in District/Conference play and culminated his career by being selected the Most Valuable Player of the State Basketball tournament.

Porter was recruited by and matriculated at Tennessee State University. After a stint in the professional ranks, Porter coached briefly at Livingstone College in Salisbury, N.C.

## JAMES "Jim" WEBSTER JR.

School(s): Parkland High School, Atkins High School

JAMES (JIM) WEBSTER, JR. was distinguished for the uniqueness of his career while switching schools during the transition period. As an upper-classman, Webster transferred from his neighborhood school at *Atkins High* to seek glory at Parkland High School.

Webster earned letters in football, basketball and baseball between the two schools. During his 1967 senior season Webster was chosen All-City, All-Conference and All-State as a devastating end and occasional linebacker.

Bill Dooley and the University of North Carolina (Chapel Hill) selected him among the first minority football recruits at the University.

Webster has coached on the interscholastic and college levels. Presently he is a professional YMCA Director in Roxboro, N.C.

## JOHN POLITE

Category: Player

School(s): Paisley High School

JOHN ALEXANDER POLITE was renowned as a leader and field general during his career at Paisley High School. He lettered in football and basketball.

Polite came into his own as an upper-class man while capturing All-City honors in football in 1966 and 1967.

All-State laurels were bestowed on this proven "coach on the field" in 1967.

## HERMAN BRYSON

Category: Coach

School(s): R. J. Reynolds High School

HERMAN BRYSON spent 36 years in athletics, 33 at R. J. Reynolds High School. A chronology of his achievements as a football mentor shows Conference Championships in 1966, 1967 and 1968. Tied in 1969 and 1970.

Bryson was Coach of the Year-Central 4-A Division, 1967. *City* Coach of the Year, 1966 and 1967.

He coached the NC Shrine team in 1968 and was coach of the West All Stars in the N.C. Coaches Clinic Game, 1969.

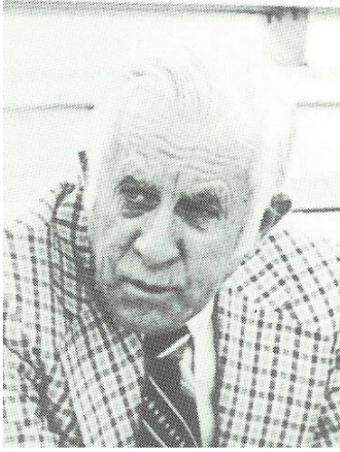
Bryson served as Head Basketball coach at Reynolds, 1952-1964.

He is a member of the Appalachian State University Hall of Fame.

## W. REID STATON

Category: Coach

School(s): Hanes High School

W. REID STATON (Deceased) came to Winston-Salem in 1942 after serving as an elementary school principal in Reidsville, N.C.

Staton coached baseball and basketball at Hanes High School where he realized tremendous results, often with outmanned teams. During his short reign as coach at Hanes High, Staton won the District Championship in Baseball (1943) and shared the baseball District Championship in 1945.

The Hanes basketball team presented Staton a banner year in 1943 by winning the District title.

Staton was chosen to coach the Shrine Bowl football team in 1945.

After a brilliant coaching career, Staton became an official and referee with the North State Officials Association for 20 years.

Staton died in 1960.

## TOM CASH

Category: Athletics Director

School(s): Parkland High School, Gray High School

TOM CASH (Deceased) retired from coaching after thirty-nine (39) years. Twenty-nine (29) years were spent in Winston-Salem, coaching or serving as Athletic Director at Gray and Parkland Senior High Schools.

Cash served as president of the North Carolina Coaches Association and the Board of Directors of the North Carolina High School Athletic Directors Association.

As a coach in Basketball, he won more than 50% of his games. In ten years of basketball coaching, Cash compiled a 175-50 record.

Cash won District titles in 1945 and 1947. At Winston-Salem Gray High, in 1946 and 1948, Cash led his charges to the coveted State Championships.
