


James Blackburn has been a steadfast supporter of athletics at all levels, especially youth athletic programs for decades, He has served as coach, supporter, referee and mentee to numerous young men and women over the years. Blackburn is well known in the Winston-Salem Youth Athletics Community for the positive impact his counseling, lectures, and one on one conversations had on former youth who are now adults. He has and still is dedicated to making a difference in the lives of others and stays in tune to the current challenges so that he can continue to share his wisdom. He is called upon often to speak on the challenges of growing up in inner city environments and keeping young men emotionally healthy.

Blackburn has been a driving force in many programs that he helped organized that had missions of helping youth through sports and mentorship such as the Incentive Program for Boys, this program involved getting African American youth involved in organized sport programs such as Pop Warner Football, Barnburner Basketball, and AAU Track and Field. This also required providing transportation and counseling these youth as support. Blackburn also was Teen Court Manager and Restitution Community Service Program Director for a program that laid the groundwork to help teen first-time offenders avoid having them having to go to court.

Blackburn spent over 20 years being a part of the Twin City Little League Baseball Organization serving as a coach, administrator, and official. This organization got youth interested in playing baseball and taught youth sportsmanship, leadership, teamwork, self-confidence, and to pursue higher academics.




In 1968 Leslie won the Mr. Mustang Award for Football (award given to the most outstanding player for each game) 7 times out of 10 games. Leslie was the first football player to be chosen the Twin City High School Player of the Week four times. He was voted All-City County, All Central 4A Conference 1st Team as a defensive end. (This team was called the Coaches' Dream Team). Leslie also received the Landreth Trophy for being the most improved player.

Leslie was elected captain of the basketball team for his senior season 1968-69. In a game against East Forsyth in February 1969, Leslie scored 37 points, had 22 rebounds, and blocked 8 shots. The 37 points tied the school record for most points scored in a game. Booker scored 22 points in the first half which matched the total that the entire East Forsyth team scored in the half.

Leslie was voted All-City County in basketball. Booker led Parkland in scoring, rebounding, shooting percentage, and just about everything else according to an article written by Mary Garber in 1969. Booker was the MVP of a Parkland team that included Mike Bennett, Mike Grace, and Paul Cloud, all of which are already members of the Winston-Salem Forsyth County High School Sports Hall of Fame.

After high school Leslie joined the Army where he retired as a Master Sergeant. Later he attended Livingstone College.

Mike Jones, who was Clayton's coach at East Forsyth stated "Michelle isn't like you might picture her, she's a pretty average-size girl, 5-foot-6 and not much more than 145 pounds. She just happens to be unusually strong and quick-footed in the circle. Her body contains a lot of muscle and very little fat."


Near the end of her senior year at East Forsyth High School, Michelle heaved the 12- pound shot nearly 40 feet to win the event at the NCHSAA 4-A State Track and Field Championships. She also won the discus competition with a throw of 124 feet, 3 1/2 inches.

Achievements:

During Michelle's track and field career while at East Forsyth High School she broke the school records for the shot put and discus in her 1992 sophomore season, which was her first at East. (She attended Millbrook High School as a freshman). She earned All-City County in the shot put and discus in 1992, 1993, and 1994. Metro 4A All-Conference in the shot put and discus in 1992, 1993, and 1994. Earned All-State honors in the shot put as a junior in 1993. In her senior season 1994, she broke the City-County record for the discus throw, she earned All-State honors in the shot put and the discus. As a senior Michelle was also the Outdoor NCHSAA State Track and Field Discus Champion. To top that she was the Indoor and Outdoor NCHSAA State Track and Field Shot Put Champion.

Michelle accepted a track scholarship to East Carolina after turning down offers from Wake Forest, UNC-Chapel Hill, Virginia Tech, Appalachian State, Western Carolina, and UNC-Wilmington.

In 2012 Michelle was inducted into the inaugural class of the East Forsyth High School Hall of Fame.



Born and raised in Durham, North Carolina, Hayes is a veritable sports legend in North Carolina as an athlete, coach, educator, administrator and champion for young people. Coach Hayes has mentored and served as a father figure to thousands of young athletes. Coach Hayes' overriding passion is for the betterment of America's youth and he actively serves the community with various organizations, most notably with the Boy Scouts of America. A member of the Southern Region Boy Scouts Executive Board, Hayes' exemplary efforts earned him the Boy Scouts' highest local honor, the Silver Beaver Award. Following his Silver Beaver Award, Hayes earned the Silver Antelope Award in May of 2001, the highest regional award that can be bestowed upon a Boy Scout volunteer.

Hayes, grew up just a few blocks from the campus of North Carolina Central University (NCCU) in Durham, N.C., he was a multi-sport student-athlete at Durham's Hillside High School. Following a stellar high school career, he enrolled at NCCU and played four seasons of football as a center and linebacker, earning three All-America awards before graduating in 1965 with a degree in physical education.

After graduating from NCCU, Hayes worked the high school football circuit as an assistant coach making stops at Northside High School in Gretha, Virginia (1965), Paisley High School (1966) and North Forsyth High School (1967-71) in Winston-Salem, N.C., where the Vikings won a State Championship, as well as at his alma mater Hillside High School (1972).

He accepted his first college coaching job in 1973 at Wake Forest University, becoming the first African American coach in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Three years later, in 1976, Hayes took over as the head football coach at Winston-Salem State University a position he would hold from 1976-87. During his 12 seasons at WSSU, the Rams, captured three Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association (CIAA) championships (1977, 1978 and 1987) and seven division championships, turned in back-to-back undefeated regular season marks in 1977 and 1978 and posted an overall record of 89-40-2.

In 1988, Hayes was hired as the head football coach at North Carolina A&T State University where he guided the Aggies to an 11-2 record and the 1999 Sheridan Broadcasting Network Black College National Championship as well as leading the Aggies to a total of three MEAC titles, two NCAA Division I-AA playoff appearances and an overall record of 106-64-0 in 15 seasons.


In all, Hayes spent 27 seasons as a collegiate head football coach, compiling a 195-104-2 overall record enroute to establishing himself as the winningest coach at both Winston-Salem State and North Carolina A&T as he finished his career with more victories (195) than any other college football head coach in the history of the State of North Carolina.

In 2003, Hayes moved over into administration at his alma mater, NCCU. During his four-year tenure, he made a significant impact on the program by placing great emphasis on reviving the rich traditions of Eagle Athletics. Hayes went on to become a very successfully administrator at Florida A&M University and Winston-Salem State University. Hayes was a true fundraising visionary at all three universities. While at Winston-Salem State University the football program advanced all the way to the NCAA Division 2 National Championship Game.

Hayes has been inducted into nine halls of fame, including the North Carolina Sports Hall of Fame, Black College Sports Hall of Fame, North Carolina Central University Athletic Hall of Fame, Durham Hillside High School Hall of Fame, North Carolina A&T State University Sports Hall of Fame, Winston-Salem State University Clarence E. Gaines Athletic Hall of Fame, Eastern North Carolina Sports Hall of Fame, Guilford County Hall of Fame, and the Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association John B. McLendon, Jr. Hall of Fame.

Some baseball players are natural hitters, others are better as pitchers, Greg Holt filled both roles while playing at West Forsyth. Greg was quoted as saying he was definitely a pitcher who hits. Greg was also an outstanding 3rd baseman, he became one of the most prolific players in school history. He held a host of school hitting records and was one of the staff pitching aces for all four years of his high school career. As a senior in 2007 Greg pitched his first seven-inning no hitter of his career against East Rowan. He was ranked the No. 8 prospect in the state by Impact Baseball, and No. 216 in the country by Baseball America.

As a junior Holt pitched a perfect game and posted six wins with 79 strikeouts in 57 innings pitched. At the plate, he led the team with 7 home runs, hit .366, drove in 31 runs and had a slugging percentage of .789.

As a sophomore, Holt batted .416, drove in 42 runs and hit 6 home runs with a slugging percentage of .703. Holt was a four-time All-State player (2004, 2005, 2006, and 2007), a four-time Central Piedmont All-Conference player (2004, 2005, 2006, and 2007) and two-time Central Piedmont Conference Player of the Year. 





Two games into Cecil Oliver's senior football season Assistant Coach Tom Muse and Head Coach Homer Thompson decided that Parkland's backfield needed a change. They switched Oliver from fullback to halfback. Oliver was reluctant about the change because he was admittedly known as a "straight-ahead runner." Oliver had enjoyed a stellar fullback career his freshman and sophomore seasons at Hill Junior High School and his junior year at Parkland High School. (During Oliver 's career the Winston-Salem Forsyth County School System was divided up into a 2 plus 2 plus system, students where assigned to different schools for 9th and 10th grades, and 11th and 12th grades). Oliver didn't agree with the change at first but the results were obvious, he rushed for 135 yards and 2 touchdowns in the game following the position change. Oliver learned that he could find his open holes better from the halfback position. The position change propelled Oliver to an award winning senior season. Oliver was the City's Leading Scorer. Oliver's accomplishments resulted in him being selected for the:





Tim White has 30 years coaching experience in Winston-Salem Forsyth County School System. He has coached football, basketball, and baseball throughout the Southeast region. After serving as Assistant Athletic Director at R.J. Reynolds High School for over 5 years, Timothy White returned to East Forsyth his high school alma mater. White, a 1974 graduate of East Forsyth, supervised 32 teams and 13 sports. He spent more time at school than he did at home, from mowing fields, to working on schedules, hiring coaches, and general athletic field maintenance. Tim always gave 100% to East Forsyth and continues to do so as the Chairman of East Forsyth's Hall of Fame Committee.

Under his leadership East Forsyth athletic teams captured 38 Conference Championships, 1 Mary Garber Championship in 2003, 2 Frank Spencer titles in 2006 and 2013, and one state championship with Indoor Track in 2007-2008. Mr. White was the Athletic Director for 14 years, from 1999-2013. White replaced old scoreboards in the Football, Baseball, Softball stadiums and on the Basketball court with new scoreboards and also installed lights on the softball field during his tenure as athletic director at East Forsyth. Mr. White was responsible for replacing the gym floor in the auxiliary gym with wood flooring and the floor was dedicated in his honor, the "Tim White Court" on January 23, 2015.

Finding money to pay for the various team needs was always a challenge so White resurrected the annual East Forsyth High Booster Club Golf Tournament fundraiser during his tutelage.
